## ABOUT GUGAH NURANI INDONESIA

Gugah Nurani Indonesia (GNI) is a humanitarian non-government organization who works based on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) particularly in child rights fulfilment and community development.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia is an organization with legal entity under Surat Keputusan Menteri Hukum dan Hak Asasi Manusia No. AHU-594.AH.01.04 in 2009.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia was founded in 2008 by Good Neighbors International, an international humanitarian development NGO established in Korea in 1991. It was granted General Consultative Status from the United Nations of Economic and Social Council (UN ECOSOC). Good Neighbors presented in Indonesia for the first time during tsunami disaster relief in Aceh in 2005.

Nowadays, Gugah Nurani Indonesia has broaden its works to 17 Community Development Project (CDP) located throughout western to eastern part of Indonesia.

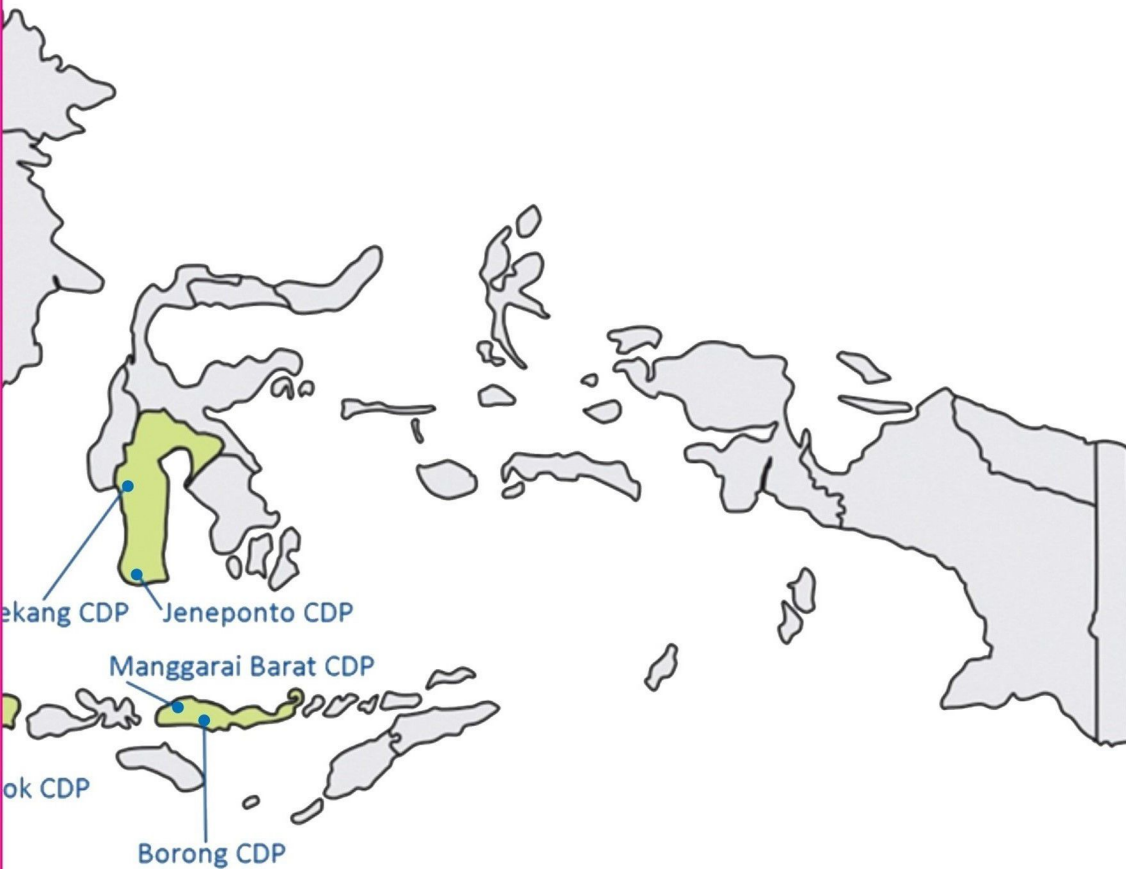

## 2016 HIGHLIGHTS



### UNIVERSAL CHILDREN'S DAY CELEBRATION

GNI held a celebration of Universal Children Day with more than 400 children attending various activities such as food and merchandise bazaar and music concert in Menteng Park, Jakarta. In the event, children were offered to attend variety of workshops and games. The event was also held to launch GNI's mini album compilation, "The Kids Are Alright". Together with 5 indie label musicians, we dedicated this album for children. Other than the celebration, we also ran Mobile Music Workshop where in total almost 250 children participated from 6 CDPs. Through this workshop, participants were able to create music and write its lyrics on their own.



### NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON CHILD PROTECTION MECHANISM

GNI and our partners held the National Conference on Child Protection Mechanism at Grand Sahid Jakarta. The conference was held under the theme of "Reflection on The 25 Years of The Ratification of The Convention on The Rights of The Child".

Other than to reflect, the conference also aimed to establish coordination system and witness & victims protection service as well as finding new formula on child protection mechanism. 250 participants coming from local and international NGOs, private, sectors, academic, researchers, activists actively contributed to the conference. Not only adults, 40 children also participated in children panel to speak up about their thoughts and concerns on the future world. This conference resulted in 11 points of recommendation from general panels and 6 points of recommendation from children panel to protect children and their rights.

## FOURTH ASIAN FORUM ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD



GNI were invited to attend 4th Asian Forum on the Rights of the Child which was held in Bali. The forum aimed to provide opportunity in sharing experiences and good practices among Asian countries to protect children's rights and fostered further cooperations between its international participants. The results of this Forum was 10 points of Bali Declaration of the Fourth Asian Forum on the Right of the Child which consist of several initiatives to develop of child friendly cities and realize best interests for children. The initiatives stressed the needs for every Asian countries to follow Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) as standards of child rights implementation in the field as well as ensuring that every decision made is based on the best interest of child while at the same time giving children chance to express their opinion and participation in issues related to their life.

## CHILD EMPOWERMENT SERVICE FOR TEENAGERS (CFT)



Successfully conducting Child Empowering Service (CES) for 4-8 years old children in 2015 to prevent child sexual abuse through puppets and story telling, GNI expanded its scope of beneficiaries and developed the modules to be CES for Teenagers (CfT) and Parents (CfP) during 2016. Understanding changing health situation for teenagers, CfT focus on giving knowledge and understandings about reproductive health. We realized that in order to achieve better results in improving health situation of our supported areas, we must involve the parents. Thus, we provided CfP to educate parents about the bad effects of child marriage as well as reproductive health in order to raise their awareness of the issues.

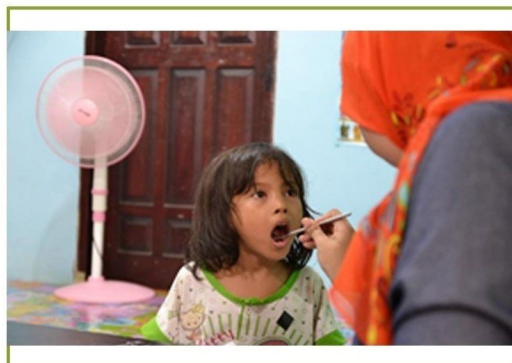

In contribution of improving the health status of children and community in our supported areas, GNI provided basic medical services, nutrient-rich food, and health education. To realize this goal, GNI works with Community Health Workers (CHW) in running activities related to health.



### Nutrition

In 2016, GNI conducted several activities which aimed to improve nutrition intake of children. With the help from CHW, milk and supplementary food were provided and distributed at several Posyandu (integrated health service posts) in our supported area. In school-based activity, parents were actively involved in cooking food to be distributed to students. To support high involvement of community members, GNI also provided trainings related to healthy meals and nutrition for all parties participated in the effort to increase children's nutrition.

### Waste Bank in Medan Belawan CDP

To overcome waste problem in the surrounding area, Medan Belawan CDP developed waste bank project during 2016. It was named 'Berkah' Waste Bank which means "blessing" in English. In cooperation with Sicanang Waste Bank in Medan City to conduct trainings for the committee, Berkah Waste Bank successfully attracted more than 70 people to join as members by the end of year.







## INCOME GENERATION





GNI implements income generation projects which considers local resources and its potential. GNI expands the scope of its income generation programs from simply supporting production activities to improving their entrepreneurship and financial management skills. In 2016, we supported community to develop their business in agriculture, livestock, and small enterprises through trainings and providing technical assistance from experts. Besides assistance, GNI also supported initial capital for IG group members to develop their business.

GNI helps communities to discover their strengths and grow their capacity to become self-reliant. In conducting our various activities, we involve community members and local youth. In every CDP, we established Community Development Committee (CDC) as organization partner to implement our activities. In 2016, 271 people joined as members in CDC where almost 44% among them are women. Realizing the importance of youth, we engaged 324 local youths as volunteers in running our daily activities for children. To increase their capacity and strengthen teamwork in the CDP, GNI held trainings and outings targeting to CDC members and volunteers.



Besides local community members, GNI also realizes the importance of building partnerships with other institutions and organizations as well as local government to create lasting and sustainable impact. Thus, we worked in cooperation with our partners in running several activities in our supported area. Some of this cooperation were also strengthened through MoU signing between two parties.

GNI considers child rights to be recognized as a first step towards fulfilling human rights. Children are subject to their own rights and responsibilities according to their age and stage of development. In advocacy process, GNI takes part in promoting the issue to raise awareness on the rights of the child for adults and children. GNI also initiated cooperation with local government to encourage the fulfilment of child rights.

### Children Day Celebration

July 23rd is Children's Day in Indonesia however many people, unfortunately, are still unaware of this special day for children. Thus, GNI held a special event to celebrate National Children Day in all 17 CDPs through child rights campaigns, children performances and competitions. GNI also involved in National Celebration of Children Day in Lombok Praya together with Ministry of Child Protection and Women Empowerment.





## Child Empowering Service (CES) for Teenagers and Parents

Receiving support from Miwon Group Indonesia/Daesang Corporation Korea, GNI developed CES for Teenagers (CfT) and CES for Parents (CfP) in 2016. This development was based on CES project in 2015 which focused on giving education for 4-8 years old children about child sexual abuse. Thus, we expand the project towards teenagers by delivering knowledge about reproductive health. The project also targeted parents to have the same awareness and perception. Raising awareness about this issue also aimed towards decreasing number of child marriage which is still a big issue to tackle in Indonesia.

## Birth Certificate Project in Lombok Mertak CDP

Low rate of children who have birth certificate among supported children and National Government Policy encouraged Lombok Mertak CDP to approach Lombok District Office of Civil Registration & Population to make sure that every child has birth certificate. This project took place at three different points in Mertak village for 6 days which is one of our supported village. In addition to the issuance of birth certificates this program facilitates the electronic recording of ID cards for adults.

## APPROPRIATE TECHNOLOGY

In 2016, Gugah Nurani Indonesia applied appropriate technology required to help fundamentally solve poverty and environmental issues. Biogas is renewable energy source that can be used to generate electricity and heat. Though biogas is not really a new technology, it is not yet properly introduced and developed in Indonesia regardless benefits it offers. Together with Yayasan Rumah Energi Mataram, West Nusa Tenggara, GNI developed biomass project to produce biogas from animal manure and human waste in Lombok Mertak CDP, West Nusa Tenggara and Borong CDP, East Nusa Tenggara.



### Cow Dung Biogas in Lombok Mertak CDP

Since cow dung is easily found everywhere in the communities around Paku subvillage, Mertak village, biomass can be produced to help poor families in improving the use of their limited resources. GNI and Yayasan Rumah Energi Mataram developed a processing technology to make biogas from cow dung. Biogas produced is then used to generate power for lamp as well as heat for stove where people now use biomass cookstoves instead of wood fired one.

### Biomass Fertilizer

One of advantages of biomass project is even its residue can bring another value to improve people's living condition. Our beneficiaries of biomass project in Lombok Mertak CDP now use biomass residue as fertilizer for chili and tomato cultivation. Not only as organic fertilizer, GNI also encouraged them to produce natural pesticide by giving them training on how to process the liquid residue.

### Integrated Sanitation – Clean Energy Development Project in Borong CDP

Bangka Kantar village is one of Borong CDP's supported area which do not have access to proper toilet thus open defecation is still a common practice among community members. A recent study showed that human waste is able to produce enough energy to provide power. By constructing public toilet facility and connect it to biomass digester, human waste from the toilet will be used to produce biogas which then can generate power for lamp and biomass cookstove. Offering extra advantages in using the public toilet can encourage people to change their behaviour. Therefore, introducing biomass from human waste can also aim to address two important issues which are behaviour change for hygiene to tackle open defecation and the need for low-cost energy sources.

### Emergency Relief for Flood in Padang

In March, heavy rains caused the river to overflow and affected 4 sub-districts in Padang, West Sumatra. Gugah Nurani Indonesia supported five places around Pasie Nan Tigo village which is one of GNI's supported area in Padang. GNI distributed food and other basic necessities to community members effected by the flood as emergency response. After the situation got better, we also provided notebooks for children to support them in coming back to school.

### Emergency Relief for Flood in West Aceh District

Floods in West Aceh District affected 139 villages from 9 sub-districts and 49,856 people from 14,245 households became temporary displaced (based on data from West Aceh Disaster Management Agency). GNI's target was the ones who got affected the most and did not receive any aid therefore we provided assistance in terms of food and basic necessities for emergency situation to 5 villages in 3 subdistricts: Alue batee village (Arongan Subdistrict), Cot Amun and Rangkileh villages (Samatiga subdistrict), Alue Leuhob village and Napai village (Woyla Barat subdistrict).





## Emergency Relief for Flood in Muara Gembong, Bekasi

In April, areas in Muara Gembong, Bekasi district were flooded due to broken dam in which destroyed two houses. Gugah Nurani Indonesia conducted emergency relief by distributing personal livelihood items consisted of food and other basic necessities to the most seriously damaged areas as well as raw materials like bamboo and sacks to repair the dam. However, since the dam was built for temporary, heavy rains in November caused the dam broken and flood, once again, came to the residence area. As a response, GNI arranged distribution of medicines for diarrhea, skin ointment, and cajuput oil for community members affected. All the distribution was conducted with the involvement of local leaders directly to the community. GNI also contributed raw materials for dam emergency repair before local government fix the dam permanently. For all responses, GNI worked together with Tagana (Taruna Siaga Bencana), a disaster relief team from Social Office of Bekasi subdistrict.

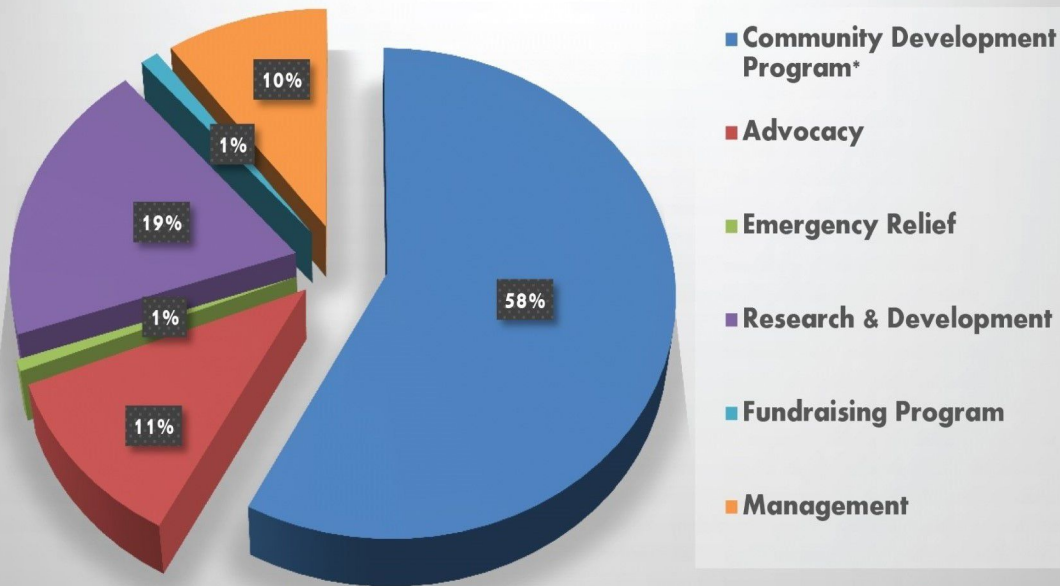
